# Discussions in HIV Care in Foreign vs Domestic Populations

#### **Results of Topic Selection Process**

The topic, *Discussions in HIV Care in Foreign vs Domestic Populations*, relates to differences in social stigma associated with HIV in other countries as compared to the United States, and potential cultural differences related to discussions of HIV and HIV status. While this is an important topic, it does not represent a healthcare intervention and therefore could not be further assessed and considered by the Effective Health Care Program. **Topic Name:** HIV Discussions in Foreign vs Domestic Populations

**Nominator:** Individual

**Nomination Summary:** The nominator is interested in why individuals with HIV who live outside of the United States have more difficulty discussing HIV than those in the United States with the virus. The nominator is interested in subpopulations, including homosexual men, those with substance abuse, and those in recovery. This topic is important because of the social stigma associated with HIV. The nominator wishes to start an international conversation to reduce this stigma, and increase the knowledge of certain HIV treatments. The nominator hopes that an AHRQ systematic review will identify knowledge gaps and inform policy priorities in the foreign and domestic HIV population.

#### **Key Questions from Nomination:**

Key Question 1a: Why is it more difficult for Sub-Saharan and Southeast Asian populations with HIV to discuss their disease when compared to US populations with HIV?

Key Question 1b: In homosexual men and those in substance abuse programs or recovery?

**Policy and/or Clinical Context from the Nomination:** The nominator conducted research focusing on Black individuals born outside of the United States and how they perceive HIV. The nominator found that they would not discuss HIV, that there was an overarching social stigma associated with the disease, and that they were unaware of the different therapies that may provide more positive outcomes.
